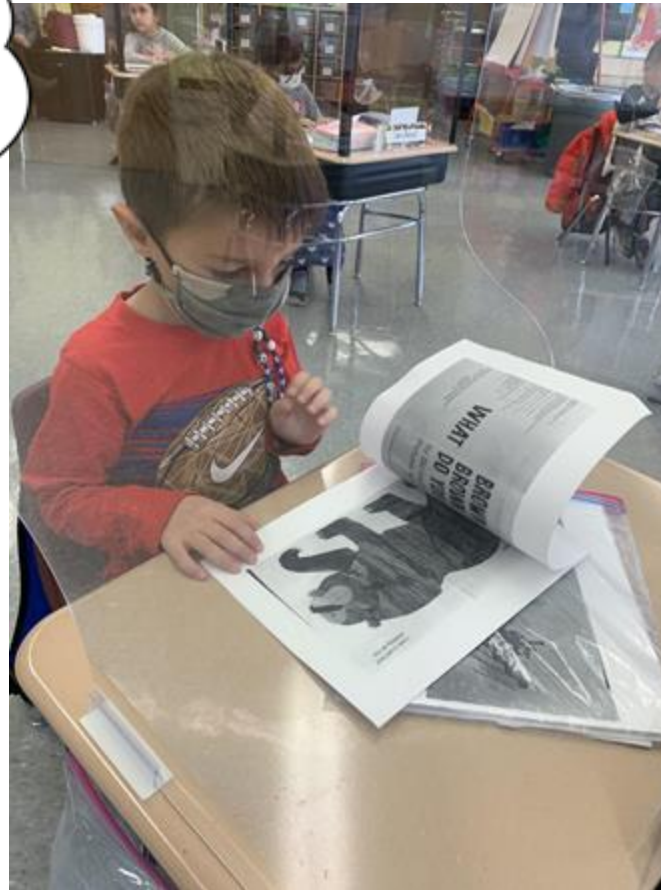
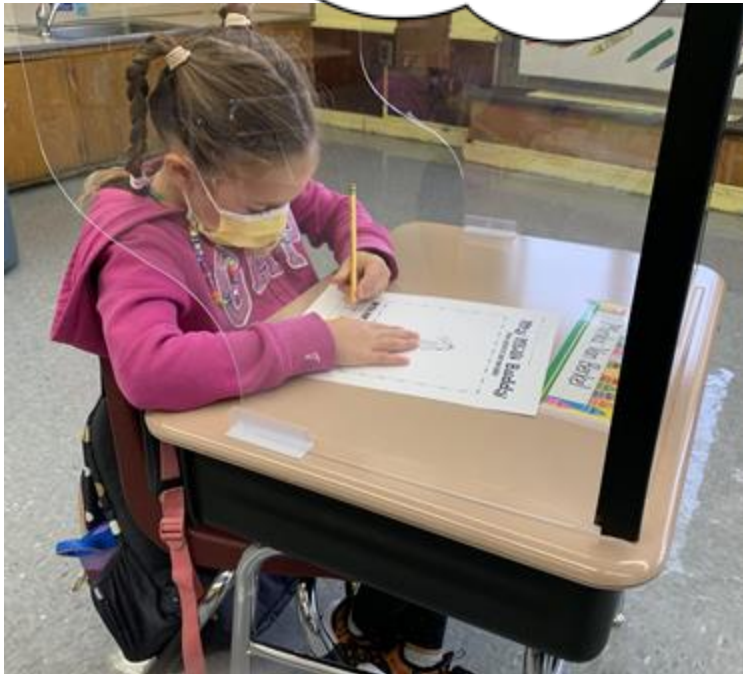
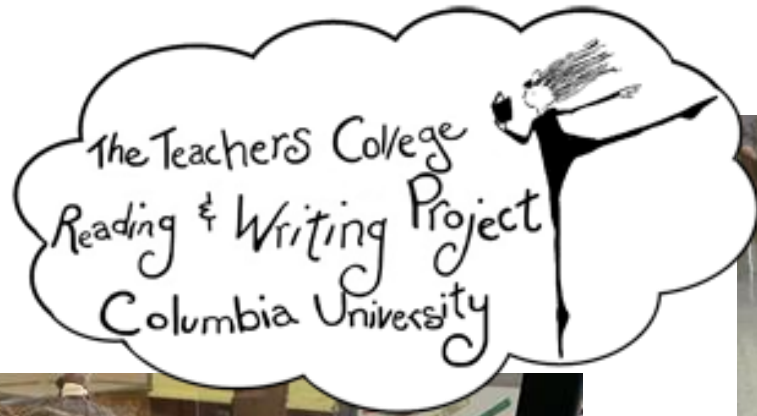

Students record themselves talking about their reading and writing.



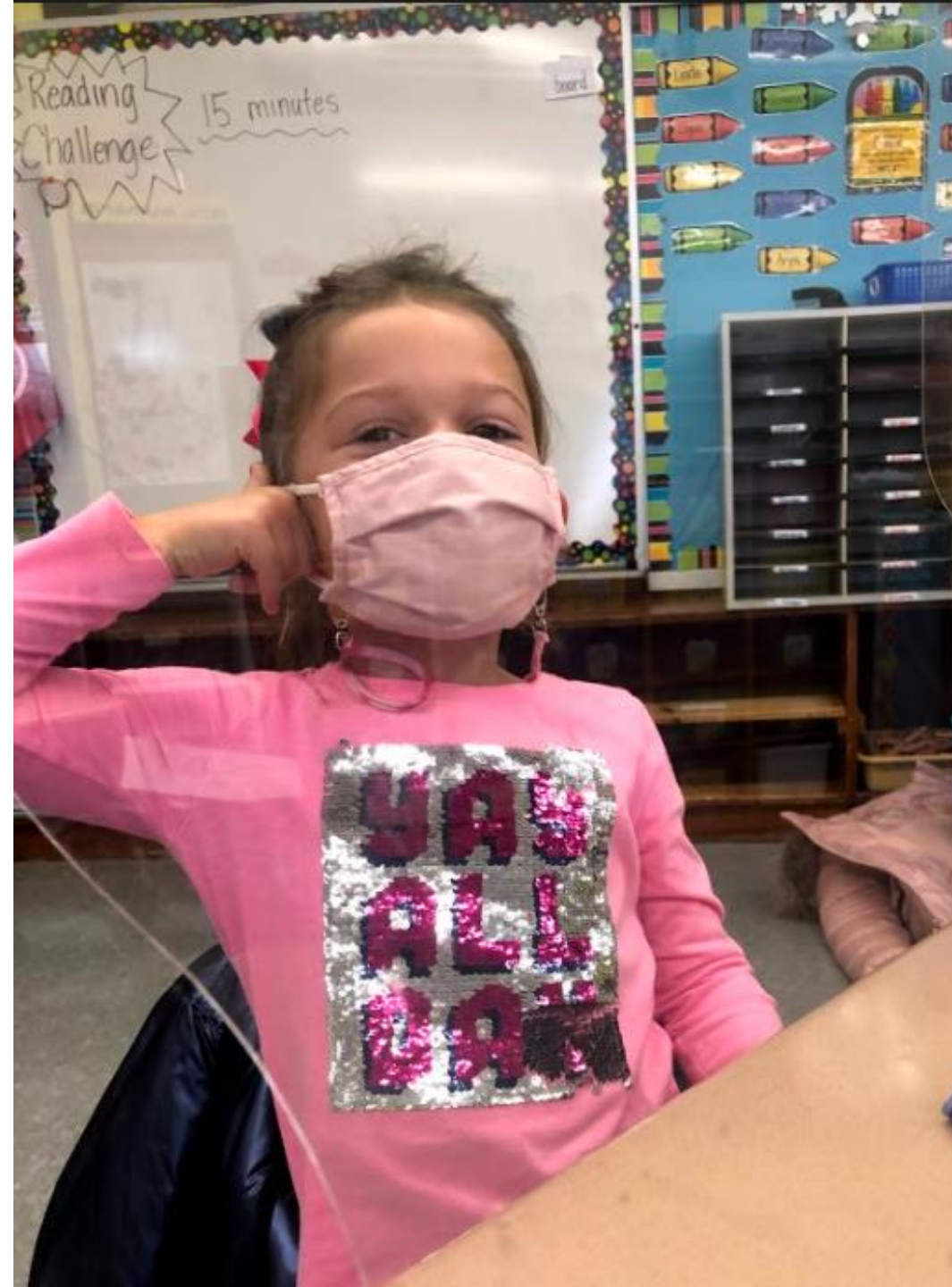
In Google Meet students converse with each other in small groups while in school or from home.

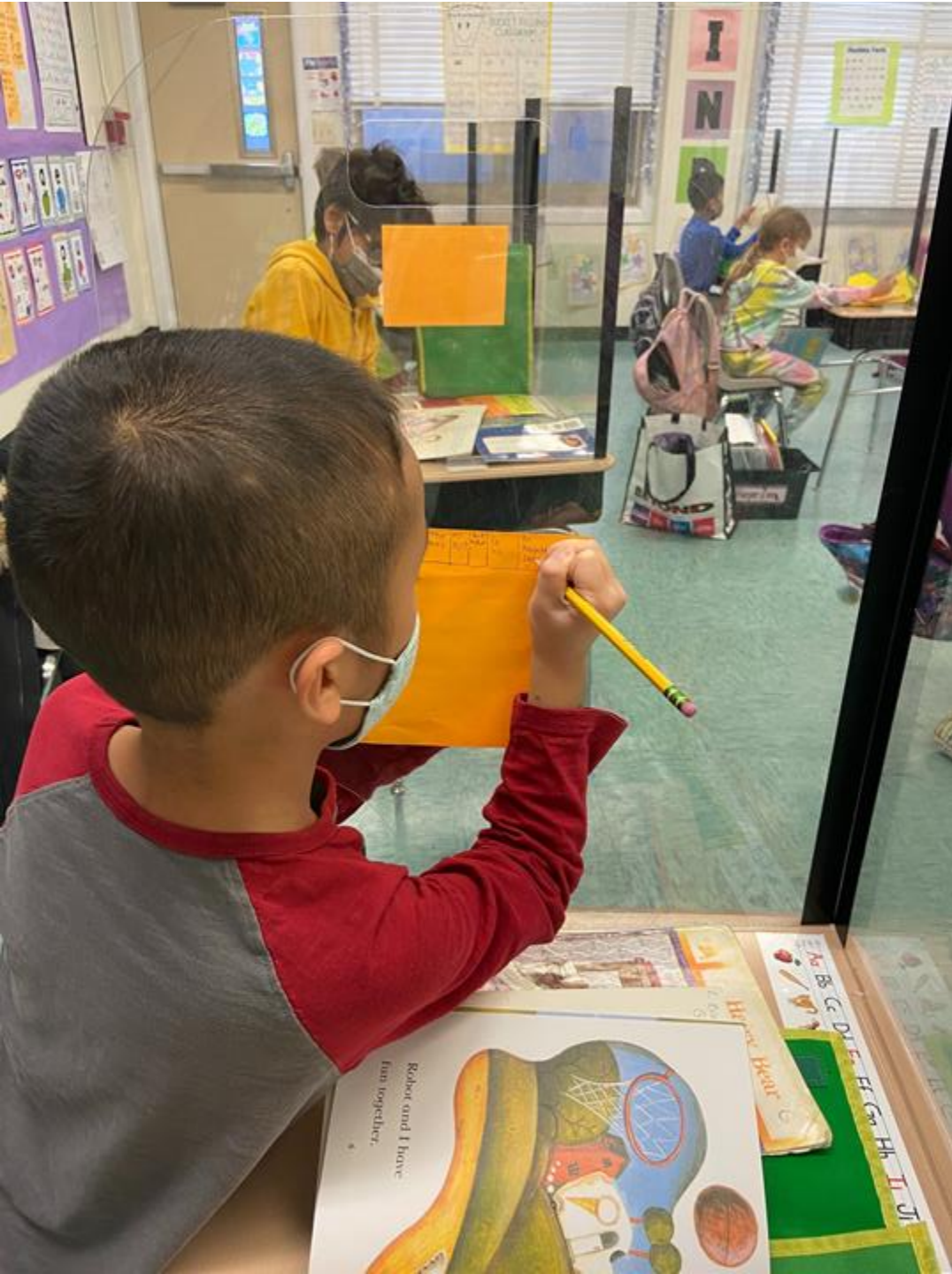
